Peter David (September 23, 1956 - May 24, 2025)







Peter Allen David, self-proclaimed "writer of stuff," had a life not easily condensed. He was a lifelong fan of comic books, science fiction, and the New York Mets.

Peter began reading comics at an early age and attending conventions starting in 1971. A trained journalist, he briefly wrote for newspapers before branching into fiction, selling a story to *Asimov's Science Fiction* in 1980. He then moved into publishing, first working in editorial at E.P. Dutton before taking a position in sales and distribution at Playboy Press, where he wrote six Photon novels under a pseudonym.

After Playboy Press closed, Peter was hired at Marvel, where he worked once again in sales and marketing. At the same time, he began to sell comic book stories. He drew rave reviews for his scripts in *Spectacular Spider-Man* in 1985 before starting a now legendary 12-year run on *The Incredible Hulk*. When Peter went freelance, he added the writing chores on DC Comics' *Star Trek* to his workload. At DC, he enjoyed runs on *Supergirl*, *Aquaman*, and teen favorite title *Young Justice*. He also had a well-received tenure at Marvel on X-Factor and co-created *Spider-Man 2099*. When the comic book industry's two giants came up with the massive *DC versus Marvel* crossover event, Peter was tapped as co-writer.

His other comics work included *Dreadstar* at First Comics, *Spyboy* at Dark Horse Comics, and *Soulsearchers and Company* at Claypool. He created *Fallen Angel* for DC, which was subsequently published by IDW.

At the same time, Peter began a prose writing career, generating original novels including *Knight Life*, *Howling Mad*, and *Artful*. For Pocket Books, he created the *Sir Apropos* series of novels, which then moved to Crazy 8 Press, where the fourth and final volume was finally released. His media tie-in novels included numerous *Star Trek* novels. He created, with John Ordover, the *New Frontier* novel franchise for Pocket Books, the first *Star Trek* book series featuring a protagonist never established on the screen. Peter also wrote novelizations of a wide range of movies, from *The Return of Swamp Thing* to *The Rocketeer* to *Iron Man*.

He wrote But In Digress, a weekly column for The Comic Buyer's Guide, and helped James Doohan with his autobiography. His Write for Comics and Graphic Novels with Peter David was a must-read for developing writers.


Peter's screen work included four low-budget films for Full Moon Entertainment as well as episodes of TV series *Babylon 5*, *Ben 10*: *Ultimate Alien*, and *Young Justice*. With Bill Mumy, he co-created Nickelodeon's *Space Cases*. He also wrote for video games, notably *Spider-Man*: *Edge of Time*.

Peter first appeared at Shore Leave XI in 1989, joining his friend Bob Greenberger, and became a fixture at the con. He conceived Mystery Trekkie Theater to ensure he would keep on being invited back. When Michael Jan Friedman joined the guest list in 1992, the Mystery Trekkie troupe was complete, and what would become nearly thirty years of wacky performances and skits commenced.

Perter married Myra Kasman in 1977. They raised three daughters: Shana, Guinevere, and Ariel. Peter and Myra divorced in 1996, and Peter married Kathleen O'Shea in 2001. Peter and Kathleen have a daughter, Caroline.

Peter suffered a stroke in 2012 and gamely recovered enough to appear at Farpoint the following February. However, in 2022; a series of health complications began, alternately confining him to either a hospital or a rehab facility. Peter passed away in his sleep on the evening of May 24, leaving a legacy as a shining light in the world of popular fiction.



Margaret Clark (October 13, 1955 - March 16, 2025)



series fiction of Star Trek: Enterprise and Star Trek: Voyager. A native New Yorker, Margaret is survived by three siblings and several nieces and nephews.

Welcome to Shore Leave 45, and welcome to the annual gathering of our fannish family. Make yourselves comfortable, peruse the program, and connect with old and new friends.



Health and Safety Policy

The health and well-being of our attendees, guests, vendors, and staff are our highest priority. As a fan-run convention, we are committed to promoting public health and safety.



Health Guidelines:

Despite our commitment, we recognize that the risk of exposure to communicable illness exists in any public place where people are present. As such, we request that you respect the following guidelines while attending:

- We strongly encourage all attendees to be up to date on vaccinations, including COVID-19 and seasonal flu.
- Preventative masking for the immunocompromised is encouraged.
- If you are experiencing symptoms of illness (fever, cough, sore throat, etc.), we kindly ask that you limit time in public and wear a mask.
- Please remember to wash your hands, as well as practice social distancing as needed.
- On-site first aid and a medical support (Medic) team will be available throughout the event.
- Please report any health concerns or emergencies to the nearest event staff member or visit the Security Table in the Lower Level Lobby.

Necessary Administrative Stuff (The Rules)



Convention Rules

- Convention Areas consist of the Vendor Hall and the hallways and rooms around them on the Lobby Level, all rooms and hallways on the Lower Level, as well as the Theater and all rooms attached to it.
- Alcoholic beverages are not allowed in any Convention Area. The only exception to this is where the Hotel officially provides alcohol.
- Pennsylvania State Law prohibits all outside alcohol at the Convention.
- No unsheathed swords or knives, uncapped prop, paintball, airsoft, or splatter guns, laser tag, or similar articles will be allowed. Laser pointers are not allowed in the Convention Areas (with the exception of those used by speakers) as they may cause eye injury.
- Smoking is not allowed in any public area of the Hotel.
- Damage to the Hotel or Convention property is the financial responsibility of the perpetrator. Parents and legal guardians are responsible for damages done by minors.
- Badges must be worn within the Convention Areas at all times. Lost badges will be replaced for a \$30 fee.
 Proper photo identification must be provided.
- Interference with Shore Leave Security or with Convention radio communications will *not* be permitted.
- It is the Hotel's policy that pets are not allowed in the Hotel (see our "Service Animals and Pets" policy on p.5).
- Please respect the posted parking restrictions in the lot for handicapped persons and for vendors. Parking there is by permit only!
- Any disruption in the Convention Areas, as well as any violations of the Convention rules, will result in immediate expulsion from the Convention. Refunds will *not* be given.
- Practice the principles of IDIC, The Golden Rule, common sense, and have a good time!!
- Thank you. We appreciate your cooperation.

Seating Policy

Seat saving will not be allowed in the Theater. If the room becomes full, five (5) minutes before each speaker starts, all empty seats will be declared free. Convention Security will assign empty seats.

Personal Conduct Policy

Shore Leave is to be enjoyed by all people present, including attending fans, guests, and staff. In order for everyone to comfortably participate in the activities in a somewhat crowded environment, we all need to agree to respect each other, our personal spaces, our differing opinions, and to share responsibility for everyone's personal, physical, and emotional comfort and safety. We expect courtesy and cooperation from everyone in this regard. If anyone feels they cannot resolve an uncomfortable situation on their own, please do not hesitate to seek out a member of our committee for assistance. If you feel that your or someone else's safety is at risk, please contact Shore Leave security, hotel security, or local law enforcement. If, in the opinion of the con chairs, an episode of harassment has occurred, the person committing the offense will have their badge confiscated and will be asked to leave the convention without compensation.

Ten-Forward Policy

When Ten-Forward closes, the room is *closed*. This is so that we can get the room set up for programming to begin on time Sunday. By Pennsylvania State Law, outside alcohol is not permitted, and violators will be asked to leave Ten-Forward.

Video Recording Policy

Electronic recording of *any* kind (videotape, DVD, cell phone, etc.) is *not* allowed in the Theater.

Photo Opportunities

Photo Op sessions take place beginning Saturday morning in Vistas Café on the main (lobby) level of the hotel. Please check the Pocket Program or signs for the exact times of each session. *There are no refunds for missed photo ops!*

Arrive *no earlier* than 5 minutes prior to your session. If you arrive more than 5 minutes prior, you may be asked to vacate the area. Fans who have registered with Accessibility Services will be accommodated first. There will be a sign posted at Photo Ops telling you where to pick up your photo; allow at least one hour for the photo to be printed. If you did not pre-purchase a Photo Op, tickets *may* be available for purchase at the con.

Presentation Policy

Personal presentations while guests are on the stage are **not** permitted. This includes, but is not limited to, giving presents and asking for hugs, kisses, handshakes, or photographs with the guests.

Autograph Policy

Dina Meyer and Casper Van Dien will each sign one 8x10 photo for no additional charge during the Official Autograph Sessions on Saturday and Sunday.

One autograph is permitted, per guest, per membership badge, per day, during the official autograph sessions on an $8x10 \ photo \ only$ (no other items will be accepted). This is subject to on-site agreement with the guests.

The official autograph session line will be formed as badge numbers are announced. The lowest numbers are called and form the line first; anyone may enter the line any time after their badge number is called, but they will not be bumped in front of higher numbers that have been called. We do *not* line up in strict numerical order but by number range. Numbers will be announced in all convention areas of the hotel, so please do not linger in the area while awaiting your number – go enjoy the con!

Lone individuals who have registered with Accessibility Services may report to the waiting area of the autograph line when the number range for their badge is announced. They will be fed into the line when their number range reaches the front of the line. Individuals who have registered with Accessibility Services that are with a companion or a group may report to the waiting area when the companion or the remainder of the group enters the autograph line. The individual will be allowed to join the companion or group when they reach the waiting area.

Groups with badge numbers in different number ranges who wish to enter the line together must wait until the number range of the highest badge number within their group is called.

Vendors may report to the waiting area of the autograph line when the number range for their badge is announced. They will be fed into the line when their number range reaches the front of the line. Please note that this can still take some time, so the following options are recommended:



- Have a trusted individual wait in line with any vendor badges and items to be signed.
- Arrive near the end of the autograph session.
- Wait until Sunday when the autograph session is generally smaller.

Any other feed-ins are handled on a case-by-case basis.

It is *not* permitted to present gifts to our celebrity guests during the official autograph session. Gifts may be presented to the guests only while they are at their table. Please keep in mind that most, if not all, of the guests travel by air and are constrained by baggage size and weight limitations.

Service Animals and Pets

The hotel does not allow pets but will accept service animals in accordance with the law.

Disabled individuals who require any accommodation under the ADA including the admittance of a service animal to the convention areas are asked to check in with Accessibility Services for the appropriate badge ribbons.

ADA Service Dogs only are permitted in the convention areas!


We will accept fully trained service dogs, not emotional support animals per ADA rules. No dogs "in training" will be permitted in the convention areas.

Dogs that show fearful reactions, aggression towards people or other dogs, growling, showing teeth, biting, licking, uncontrolled behavior, such as pulling owner on leash (unless helping to pull a wheelchair), jumping on folks, shaking in fear, urinating/defecating in the convention areas, will be asked to leave the convention areas immediately.

Melissa Navia

Melissa Navia stars in *Star Trek: Strange New Worlds* as Lt. Erica Ortegas, helmsman of the USS Enterprise. Born and raised in NY, she is a Colombian-American actor and writer who has portrayed a myriad of singular characters on both the stage and screen, including roles on *Billions* (Showtime), where she played an astronaut bound for a life on Mars, and *Dietland* (AMC), where she played a vigilante on a mission of retribution for crimes against women. Other TV credits include *Bull* (CBS), *New Amsterdam* (NBC), and *Homeland* (Showtime).

Navia made her Off-Broadway debut at INTAR, a theatre company known for its history of championing new works by Latin playwrights, with a critically acclaimed performance in the world premiere of C. Julian Jiménez's *Bundle of Sticks*. Her filmography includes over a dozen indie films, including *Bel Canto* with Julianne Moore, *Sleeping with the Fishes* with Gina Rodriguez, and *Amira & Sam* with her *Strange New Worlds* co-star Paul Wesley.

While Erica Ortegas is new to the world of *Star Trek*, her surname pays homage to creator Gene Roddenberry's original vision for the crew of the Enterprise. Navia is honored to originate a role that, much like *Strange New Worlds* itself, has been almost 60 years in the making. Ortegas embodies the ideals of Starfleet and the adventurous optimism at the heart of the franchise. Navia's own STEM outreach and space advocacy work is an extension of her on-screen work. She harnesses the power of storytelling and interdisciplinary collaborations to engage, educate, and inspire audiences. Recent events of note include partnering with NASA to interview astronaut Michael López-Alegría aboard the International Space Station and hosting the National Space Society's 2024 International Space Development Conference.

Navia is also a stand-up comedian who plays the banjo and is trained in martial arts and sword fighting. She is the creator of *Girl With Short Hair*, an essay collection and one-woman show based on her stories, memories, and adventures, drawn from a lifetime of thwarting categorization and challenging society's fixation on boxing people in to avoid figuring them out.

James Frain

James Frain is currently best known for his portrayal of Spock's father Sarek in *Star Trek: Discovery*. James Frain was born in Leeds, West Riding of Yorkshire, and brought up in Stansted Mountfitchet, near Bishop's Stortford, Essex. He studied Drama and Film at the University of East Anglia, and trained as an actor at the Central School of Speech and Drama in London.

In 1993, while in his final year of drama school, Frain made his film debut in *Shadowlands*, after being spotted by the film director Richard Attenborough. In 1995, he starred as a Northern Irish terrorist in the Thaddeus O'Sullivan directed film, *Nothing Personal*.

In 2000, he was nominated for Canadian Screen Award for Best Supporting Actor at the Academy of Canadian Cinema and Television's 20th Genie Awards in Toronto, for his performance as Gustave Sonnenschein in the István Szabó directed film *Sunshine*.

Frain has also appeared in a number of television series, including *Soldier Soldier* (1993); *Armadillo* (2001); *24* (2005); *Invasion* (2006); and *The Closer* (2006). He played Thomas Cromwell in Showtime's *The Tudors*; the villainous billionaire Chess in the NBC superhero/crime drama series *The Cape*; heroic Templar Sir Gregory in the Syfy original film *Dark Relic* (2010); and vampire Franklin Mott in the HBO drama *True Blood*. In season 2 of *Grimm*, Frain joined the cast as a mysterious recurring character named Eric Renard.

He appeared in the second season of *Gotham* as Azrael, and portrayed Sarek, the father of Spock, on *Star Trek: Discovery*, the second prequel TV series in the *Star Trek* franchise.

Frain has been a regular on the stage in the United Kingdom, appearing with the Royal Shakespeare Company and Royal Court Theatre, as well as on the West End. He has also appeared on Broadway in New York. He was a recipient of the 2008 Drama Desk Award for Outstanding Ensemble Performances along with the rest of the cast of *The Homecoming* (2007).

She is best known for her role as Tyra Collette on the NBC sports drama *Friday Night Lights* (2006–2011), Bobbi Morse on the ABC superhero series *Agents of S.H.I.E.L.D.* (2014–2016), and most recently as Commander Kelly Grayson on the Fox/Hulu sci-fi comedy-drama *The Orville* (2017–2022), created by and starring Seth MacFarlane as Captain Mercer, her character's ex-husband.

Early in her career, Palicki appeared as Kara/Lindsay Harrison in the Season 3 finale of *Smallville*. That same year, she was cast as Judy Robinson in John Woo's unsold pilot *The Robinsons: Lost in Space*. In 2005, she portrayed Jessica Moore, Sam Winchester's illfated girlfriend, in the pilot episode of *Supernatural*. Her character later returned in the episodes "What Is and What Should Never Be" and "Free to Be You and Me" in Season 5. In 2006, Palicki also starred as the villainous Nadia in *Aquaman*, another WB pilot.

Palicki transitioned to film with major roles, including *Legion* (2010) and the NBC pilot *Wonder Woman* (2011), where she portrayed Diana Prince in a project produced by David E. Kelley. In 2013, she co-starred in *G.I. Joe: Retaliation* as Lady Jaye, the lead female character. Her film career also includes supporting roles in *Red Dawn* (2012) and a memorable turn as a fierce assassin in *John Wick* (2014).

In August 2014, Palicki joined the cast of *Agents of S.H.I.E.L.D.* as Bobbi Morse. Initially introduced as a recurring character, she became part of the principal cast after the midseason break in Season 2.

Beyond acting, Palicki explored her creative talents as a writer. In 2016, she teamed up with her brother, Eric Palicki, to co-write their first comic book, *No Angel*, published by Black Mask Studios. The first issue debuted on November 30, 2016.

Scott Grimes

Scott Grimes, born in Lowell, Massachusetts, and raised in Dracut, MA, began his acting career at the age of nine, starring in the Tony Award-winning Broadway show *Nine* opposite Raul Julia. He continued his theater success by playing young Charlie Chaplin in the West Coast production of *Chaplin* alongside Anthony Newley.

Grimes soon transitioned to television and film, appearing in the cult-classic sci-fi movie *Critters* and making guest appearances on hit shows such as *Who's the Boss* and *Charles in Charge*. He also starred as a series regular in *Together We Stand* with Elliott Gould. At just 13, he co-starred with Mickey Rooney in the holiday TV movie *It Came Upon the Midnight Clear*. In 1987, he voiced Pinocchio in the animated film *Pinocchio and the Emperor of the Night* and appeared in the TV movie *Bring Me the Head of Dobie Gillis* in 1988.

From 1994 to 2000, Grimes gained widespread recognition as Will McCorkle on Fox's critically acclaimed family drama *Party of Five*, starring alongside Matthew Fox, Scott Wolf, and Neve Campbell.

Grimes' film career includes roles in notable productions like *Crimson Tide* (1995), where he starred alongside Denzel Washington and Gene Hackman, and *Mystery, Alaska*, a hockey drama co-starring Russell Crowe. In 2001, he portrayed Sgt. 1st Class Donald Malarkey in HBO's award-winning World War II miniseries *Band of Brothers*, produced by Tom Hanks. He later became a fan favorite on NBC's long-running series *ER*, playing Dr. Archie Morris until its conclusion in 2009. Reuniting with Russell Crowe, Grimes played Will Scarlet in Ridley Scott's *Robin Hood* (2010) and appeared in Akiva Goldsman's *Winter's Tale* (2014) alongside Colin Farrell and Will Smith. That same year, he joined FX's Emmy-nominated drama *Justified* as Seabass, a former special ops soldier and security employee.

Grimes is also an accomplished voice actor, known for his roles on animated series such as *Family Guy* and *Annoying Orange*. He is perhaps most recognized for voicing Steve Smith on Fox's *American Dad*, where he also writes and performs original songs for the show. In 2017, Grimes reunited with Seth MacFarlane in Fox's highly anticipated dramedy *The Orville*, a futuristic series set aboard the U.S.S. Orville, a mid-level exploratory starship.

In addition to his acting career, Grimes is a talented musician and singer. He has performed on *Bob Hope TV Specials*, including a rendition of "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" for Sweden's King and Queen. His debut album, *Scott Grimes* (1989), was produced by Grammy-winning Richard Carpenter and Herb Alpert. His follow-up albums, *Livin' on the Run* (2005) and *Drive* (2010), featured hits like "Sunset Blvd," which charted on Billboard's AOR rankings. Grimes also collaborates musically with Russell Crowe, Alan Doyle (Great Big Sea), and Samantha Barks in their group, which recently released the album *Indoor Party*, produced by Carl Falk (*One Direction, Five Seconds of Summer*). The group has performed select live shows, with additional performances planned.

Beyond music and acting, Grimes is a member of *Band from TV*, a charity band featuring actors James Denton, Adrian Pasdar, Greg Grunberg, Jesse Spencer, and Bob Guiney. Since its founding, the band has raised over \$2 million for charitable causes. A Los Angeles resident and proud father of two, Scott Grimes continues to excel in acting, music, and philanthropy.




Dina Meyer



Casper Van Dien


Casper Van Dien grew up in Ridgewood, New Jersey, on Van Dien Avenue, named after his great-grandfather. When his family relocated to Florida, he attended Admiral Farragut Academy, an elite military college prep school, where he graduated as third in command. After studying at Florida State University, Van Dien moved to Los Angeles to pursue a career in acting, finding success in both film and television.

His breakthrough came when he starred as the lead in Paul Verhoeven's cult-classic *Starship Troopers* for Sony/Touchstone. He later appeared in Tim Burton's critically acclaimed film *Sleepy Hollow* for Paramount Pictures, alongside Johnny Depp, Christina Ricci, and Christopher Walken.

Van Dien also took on the title role in Warner Bros.' *Tarzan and the Lost City*. Over his career, he has starred in more than 60 films and television projects. His notable credits include *Chasing Destiny* with Lauren Graham and Christopher Lloyd, *Modern Vampires* with Kim Cattrall and Rod Steiger, *Thrill*

Michael Ironside

Michael Ironside's incredible career spans decades, beginning in the late 1970s, and is filled with unforgettable performances across film, television, and voice acting. He gained widespread recognition for his terrifying portrayal of the deadly psychic Darryl Revok in David Cronenberg's *Scanners* and was equally chilling as the misogynistic psychopath Colt Hawker in *Visiting Hours*. Other standout film roles include Detective Roersch in *Cross Country*, the crazed Overdog in *Spacehunter: Adventures in the Forbidden Zone*, the tough-as-nails Jester in *Top Gun*, Major Paul Hackett in *Extreme Prejudice*, Vietnam veteran "Ben" in *Nowhere to Hide*, the ferocious Lem Johnson in *Watchers*, and the menacing General Katana in *Highlander II: The Quickening*.

Ironside also left a lasting impression in Paul Verhoeven's science fiction classics, playing the ruthless Richter in *Total Recall* and the rugged Lieutenant Jean Rasczak in *Starship Troopers*. He showcased his range with a tender and poignant performance in *Chaindance* as a hardened convict

who befriends a disabled man—a project he also co-wrote and executive-produced. On television, Ironside made a mark as mercenary Ham Tyler in the epic miniseries *V* and its sequel *V*: *The Final Battle*.

His other notable film appearances include *The Perfect Storm, The Machinist*, and *Terminator Salvation*, where he played Resistance General Hugh Ashdown. He also guest-starred on *Andromeda* (Season 3, Episode 20) and held a recurring role in *SeaQuest 2032*. Throughout his career, Ironside has appeared in numerous hit television series, including *The A-Team, Hill Street Blues, Tales from the Crypt, Walker, Texas Ranger, ER, Smallville, Desperate Housewives, Masters of Horror*, and many more. His exceptional portrayal of biker gang leader Bob Durelle in the Canadian miniseries *The Last Chapter II: The War Continues* earned him critical acclaim and a Gemini Award nomination.

Ironside's versatility extends to blockbuster films like *X-Men: First Class*, where he played the Captain of the 7th Fleet, and television roles such as a Detroit hitman on *Justified*. He's also widely recognized for his distinctive deep voice, which he has lent to animated series, films, and video games. He voiced iconic characters like Darkseid in the DC Animated Universe (*Superman: The Animated Series, Justice League, Justice League Unlimited*), reprising the role in the video game *Lego DC Supervillains* and the *Harley Quinn* series. He also voiced Batman in *The New Batman Adventures* during a *The Dark Knight Returns* sequence.

Ironside is especially celebrated for voicing Sam Fisher in the Tom Clancy's *Splinter Cell* video game series and Jack Granger in *Command & Conquer 3: Tiberium Wars*. His voice work also includes Ultra Magnus in *Transformers*, further solidifying his legacy as one of the most versatile and memorable talents in the entertainment industry.



Seth Gilliam

Gilliam began his film career in the early 1990s, appearing in acclaimed movies such as *Still Alice*. His other notable film roles include playing Sergeant Sugar Watkins in the 1997 action film *Starship Troopers* and Sergeant Steven Altameyer in the 1996 drama *Courage Under Fire*.

On television, Gilliam has taken on a variety of recurring roles. He appeared as Aaron Dexter, the boyfriend of Erika Alexander's character, during the seventh season of *The Cosby Show*, and later portrayed Alan Deaton on *Teen Wolf*. His most prominent TV role was on *The Wire*, where he gained attention in 2008 for criticizing the show's lack of Emmy recognition despite its widespread critical acclaim. He has also made guest appearances on shows like *CSI: Miami, Nurse Jackie, Skins, Person of Interest*, and *The Good Wife*. Additionally, he played Clayton Hughes on *Oz*. In May 2014, Gilliam joined the cast of AMC's *The Walking Dead* as Father Gabriel Stokes, becoming the third actor from The Wire to join the series, alongside Chad Coleman and

Gilliam is also an accomplished stage actor. In 1993, he played Prince Edward in a production of *Richard III*. He later starred as the title character in *Othello*—first in 2010 with Boston's Commonwealth Shakespeare Company and again in 2011 at the Houston Shakespeare Festival, both productions directed by his wife, Leah C. Gardiner. In 2013, the couple returned to Houston for a production of *Antony and Cleopatra*, with Gilliam playing Antony and Gardiner directing. Gilliam has expressed his love for theater, noting that while he enjoys working in film and television, he finds stage acting more rewarding: "Acting for the stage is a lot more fun. There is instant communication with the audience. An actor can tell whether or not they're connecting with the audience or if the audience understands what's happening."

Michael Rooker

Michael Rooker, an accomplished American actor, is widely recognized for his portrayal of Yondu Udonta, the blue-skinned alien from Marvel's *Guardians of the Galaxy* franchise, as well as Merle Dixon, the fan-favorite antagonist from AMC's global hit series *The Walking Dead*.

T'Veen on Season Three of the Paramount+ series *Star Trek: Picard*, the bald badass alter-ego Hammerhead on HBO Max's *Doom Patrol*, stone-cold killer Bex Dawson on the reboot of *MacGruber* on NBC Peacock, and "The 9th Wonder of the World" CHYNA on the NBC comedy *Young Rock*, starring Dwayne Johnson.

You may have also seen her as the Post Master in *Call of the Wild* with Harrison Ford, or as Chrissy Metz's supportive best friend Melissa in the heart aching drama, *Breakthrough* or a number of other television roles.

She was featured in the cinematic trailer *Betrayed*, Bioware's *Star Wars: The Old Republic: Knights of the Eternal Throne Expansion*; they also used her as the model for the official "face" of Senya Tirall. She also appeared in the first three *Next Generation* movies and holds the unique distinction of being the only actor to wear all four Starfleet uniform colors.

Outside of *Star Trek*, Tracee was a regular lifeguard on *Baywatch*, played a police officer in *Demolition Man*, and appeared in films such as *Barb Wire*, *Gross Anatomy, Alien Danger 1 & 2, Night Mistress, Staycation, Assassin's Apprentice 2, Virtuosity*, and *Another 48 Hrs*.





Kathy Coleman

Kathy Coleman is an American television actress best known for her role as Holly Marshall on the 1970s sci-fi adventure series *Land of the Lost*. Born on February 18, 1962, in Simi Valley, California, Kathy showed an early interest in performing arts. She gained recognition as a child actor for her portrayal of the resourceful and adventurous Holly, a central character in the cult-favorite show, which first aired on NBC in 1974.

Coleman's performance on *Land of the Lost* captured the hearts of audiences with her youthful energy, courage, and charm. The show's unique premise, involving time travel and encounters with dinosaurs, made it a classic of its era. Kathy appeared in all three seasons of the show, which ran until 1976.



Born on August 17, 1951, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Eure grew up with a passion for performing, which led him to a successful career in television and beyond.

Eure gained fame playing Will Marshall, the courageous and resourceful older brother in *Land of the Lost*, which aired from 1974 to 1976. His portrayal of Will, navigating a dangerous prehistoric world with dinosaurs and alien creatures, cemented his status as a beloved figure in classic television. Bonnie Gordon



Artists, Authors, Performers, and Scientists at Shore Leave 45



Christopher Abbott is a Reader's Favorite award-winning crime, SF, and horror author. Described by New York Times Bestseller Michael Jan Friedman as "an up-and-coming fantasy voice", and compared to

Roger Zelazny's best work, Abbott's *Songs of the Osirian* series of works brings a bold re-telling of ancient Egyptian mythology. Abbott presents a fresh view of deities we know, such as Horus, Osiris, and Anubis. He weaves the godlike magic through musical poetry, giving these wonderfully tragic and deeply flawed "gods" different perspectives, all the while increasing their mysteriousness. In 2020, Christopher published *Progenitor*, his first book with Crazy 8 Press, and began writing for ScreenRant as a *Star Trek* and TV/Movies Feature Writer. He premieres three new books at Shore Leave 45.



Award-winning author, editor, and publisher of eSpec Books, **Danielle Ackley-McPhail** has worked both sides of the publishing industry for longer than she cares to admit. Her published works include eight

novels, including her latest, *The Play of Light*. She is also the author of nine solo collections, the newest being *Echoes of the Divine*, and the non-fiction writers' guide, *The Literary Handyman Library*. She is the senior editor of numerous anthologies, including the recently released *The Chaos Clock*.



The author of twenty-six novels and more than ninety short stories, **Rigel Ailur** writes in almost every genre, but mostly science fiction and fantasy. Her novels include the *Vagabonds' Adventures* action thrillers, the

Sorcery & Steel series, the science fiction series Tales of Mimion, and the galaxies-spanning Exploration. Her short stories appear in the Brave New Girls anthologies and several other anthologies including the IAMTW's Turning the Tied and Double Trouble. In nonfiction, she contributes television reviews to Outside In and to the SciFi Bulletin. Rigel premieres three new books at Shore Leave 45.



Lorraine J. Anderson has been writing for most of her life, experimenting with various types of fantastic fiction. Her work spans comic strips, fantasy stories, science fiction, fictional newspaper

columns, and young adult paranormal fiction. Some of her credits include the story "Hero" in *Star Trek:* Strange New Worlds 8 and the comic strips George and the Saint and Coffin Bones, both created with Hugo Award-nominated fan artist Sherlock, featured in print editions of Fandata's Fandom Directory. She premieres Twisting Turning Timeshifts, HERitage Volume 2 at Shore Leave 45.



Derek Tyler Attico is a bestselling, award-winning speculative fiction author, photographer, essayist, screenwriter, and role-playing game designer. His first screenplay won the Excellence in Playwriting Award

from the Dramatists Guild of America, his debut short story placed first in the *Star Trek: Strange New Worlds* anthology contest, and he received a prestigious Scribe Award nomination for his first novel, the bestselling *Star Trek: Deep Space Nine – The Autobiography of Benjamin Sisko*.



Diane Lee Baron is the author of *Gal Wonder*, her debut novel published in 2017 by FireBringer Press. Diane is now venturing into science fiction as she works on her alien invasion novel, *When the Skies*

Fell. In addition, she wrote and edited *The Fandom Fifty:* 50+ Fascinating People of the Maryland Science Fiction Conventions, a project that features interviews with committee members, authors, artists, costumers, techies, superfans, and more from the Farpoint and Shore Leave Conventions.



Christopher L. Bennett has been one of Pocket and Gallery Books' most prolific authors of *Star Trek* fiction since 2003, including the epic *Next Generation* prequel *The Buried*

Age and the Enterprise — Rise of the Federation series. He has been a contributor to Analog Science Fiction and Fact since 1998. His original creations include the epic Arachne trilogy from eSpec Books and two science fiction superhero universes, Only Superhuman from Tor Books and the full-cast audio novel series Tangent Knights from GraphicAudio. He premieres Aleyara's Descent at Shore Leave 45.



Wayne "Skip" Bird is a NASA Heliophysics Ambassador, and presently the Outreach Director/ Night Sky Network Guru for the Westminster Astronomical Society, an outreach fanatic (definition of

fanatic: someone who will not change his mind *and* will not change the subject). He is also an astronomy educator for home schools, scouts, and anyone else who gets too close. He is the world-renowned author of *Night Flying Astronomy Bird* articles.



Charles Blue (aka Blue the Science Dude) has more than 35 years of science communications experience. He currently supports NASA's Planetary Science Division. Charles has worked as the director of media

services at the American Institute of Physics. He also served as the Writer/Editor for the National Science Foundation's Directorate for Engineering and the media relations specialist for the Thirty Meter Telescope Project. Charles also served as public information officer for the National Academy of Engineering and the National Radio Astronomy Observatory. Charles also is an avid Irish banjo player, sea chantey singer, and fitness instructor.



The Boogie Knights came into being during a period where everyone they knew of as filkers were doing songs about Star Trek, Star Wars, and other high profile science-fictiony things. Where were the tales of derring-

do? Where were the stories of brave but less-thanintelligent knights, vulnerable damsels with a mean right hook, frightened livestock, and war for the sake of just kicking some serious butt? Where were the songs about mysterious creatures, old beggars who speak in riddles, paisley-clad wizards, confused cutpurses, and magic spells gone awry? Where were the psalms to gods long-forgotten, or at least temporarily displaced? And most importantly where was the top-40 music? Into this void, stepped the Boogie Knights...



Starting in 1980, **Barbara Brennan** worked in a variety of positions at the National Air and Space Museum. She was lead designer on permanent installations including How Things Fly, The Wright Brothers and the

Invention of the Aerial Age, America by Air and Pioneers of Flight. She also designed temporary exhibits for the museum's Flight and the Arts Gallery including two that displayed the Star Trek Enterprise model: The Art of Robert McCall (1984-85) and Star Trek and the Sixties (1992-93). After 32 years of service with the Smithsonian, Barbara retired in 2012 as the Museum's Chair of the Exhibits Design and Technology Division.



Dr. Kenneth Carpenter is a member of the "Exoplanets and Stellar Astrophysics Laboratory" at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, MD. He serves as the Hubble Space Telescope (HST)

Operations Project Scientist, the Ground Systems Scientist for the Roman Space Telescope (RST), and has recently been named a NASA Innovative Advanced Concept (NIAC) Fellow. He enjoys photography and is an enthusiastic fan of exploration of the Universe in which we live, the Maryland RenFest, and all things *Trek* and Disney. He has been a speaker at DragonCon, StarFest, Trek Long Island, as well as Farpoint and Shore Leave.



Russ Colchamiro is the author of *Crackle and Fire*, *Fractured Lives*, and *Hot Ash*, the first three novels in his ongoing Sci-Fi noir series featuring hardboiled private eye Angela Hardwicke. A member of

Crazy 8 Press, Private Eye Writers of America, and board member of the Mystery Writers of America NY Chapter, Russ is also the editor of the Sci-Fi mystery anthology *Love, Murder & Mayhem*, and is the author of the Sci-Fi adventure novels *Crossline*, *Finders Keepers, Genius de Milo*, and *Astropalooza*.

Russ hosts his popular Russ's Rockin' Rollercoaster podcast, interviewing a who's who of science fiction, crime, mystery, and horror authors. Russ premieres *PRISM: The Mission Files* at Shore Leave 45.



Matthew Corey made history when at age 17 he sold a script to *Star Trek: The Next Generation* that would become the basis for the episode "True Q". After working on a couple independent film projects, he wrote

the novel *Remember the Rollerdogs*, a story described as "Slap Shot" meets "Clerks." He lives a quiet life in North Carolina with his wife and children.



Greg Cox is a New York Times bestselling author renowned for his extensive collection of *Star Trek* novels and stories. His notable works include *Lost to Eternity*, *A Contest of Principles*, *The Antares Maelstrom*,

Legacies, Book 1: Captain to Captain, Miasma, Child of Two Worlds, Foul Deeds Will Rise, No Time Like the Past, The Weight of Worlds, The Rings of Time, To Reign in Hell, The Eugenics Wars (Volumes One and Two), The Q Continuum, Assignment: Eternity, and The Black Shore. His next Star Trek novel, Identity Theft, will be published in November. Cox's work has garnered him six Scribe Awards and the Faust Award for Lifetime Achievement.



Kathleen O'Shea David began her journey with puppetry at the tender age of 2, and more than four decades later, she continues to create "wiggling dolls" for both enjoyment and income. Throughout her career,

she has explored a diverse array of fields, ranging from cancer research to the music industry. Teaming up with her husband, Peter David, she adapted the first four installments of the Japanese Manga *Negima*. Additionally, she has contributed to the literary world with her short story "On a Pedestal," featured in the Big Finish anthology *Doctor Who: Quality of Leadership*. Presently, she serves as an associate editor for Time and Space magazine. Besides being a book editor, she owns No String Attached, which specializes in custom puppets, masks, and dolls. Her puppets have found homes in collections across the globe.



Randee Dawn is a Brooklynbased SFF/H author at night and an entertainment journalist during the day for publications including Today. com, NBCNews.com, Variety, The Los Angeles Times, Gold Derby.

com, and Emmy Magazine. Her humorous pop culture fantasy debut, *Tune in Tomorrow*, was published in 2022 by Solaris/Rebellion and reissued in 2024 with additional content by Solaris Nova. She has three books scheduled to publish in 2025: dark rock 'n roll fantasies *The Only Song Worth Singing* and *Leave No Trace*, both from Arc Manor/Caezik; and *We Interrupt This Program*.



Keith R.A. DeCandido's latest includes several short stories in Star Trek Explorer magazine; Supernatural Crimes Unit, a new fantasy series debuting in 2025; the Resident Evil graphic novel Infinite

Darkness: The Beginning; the fantasy novels Manticore Precinct and Feat of Clay; the collection Ragnarok and a Hard Place; Animal, the comic book adaptation of his 2021 serial-killer novel; and a whole mess of short fiction in assorted anthologies. Keith writes about pop culture for Reactor Magazine (formerly Tor.com), among other places, and is a fourth-degree black belt in karate, a musician, and a professional editor of 35 years' standing. He premieres PRISM: The Mission Files at Shore Leave 45.



The Denebian Slime Devils is a Baltimore-based filk group that's been writing and performing sci-fi, media, and pop-culture song parodies since the late 1970's. Way back when, in planning Shore Leave 2, a group of

friends who also happened to be on the con committee decided to do some filking to fill in some time during filksing. And they've been at it ever since, appearing annually at Shore Leave and other conventions, and even performing for a bar mitzvah party! Kelly Fast is the Near-Earth Object Observations Program Manager for NASA's Planetary Defense Coordination Office. She investigated ozone and atmospheric chemistry on Mars, winds on Titan, and the

effects on Jupiter's stratosphere of small body impacts as an astronomer at NASA's Goddard Space Flight Center before coming to NASA Headquarters in 2011. Previously a visiting astronomer at NASA's Infrared Telescope Facility (IRTF) on Maunakea, she is also now the IRTF Program Scientist. Dr. Fast previously served as Program Scientist for the MAVEN mission to Mars and she led NASA's Solar System Observations, Planetary Astronomy and Planetary Atmospheres research programs. Her childhood passion for *Star Trek* and *Space: 1999* led to a lifelong passion for space.



Jerry Feldman has been an avid amateur astronomer since 1996. He currently is an instructor with The Community College of Baltimore County, teaching "Sidewalk Astronomy". He is an active member

in the Harford County Astronomical Society and the Howard County Astronomical League. Mr. Feldman is an active public performer, setting up for public events from kids clubs to adult education. He has been mentioned in local newspapers, to include, the transit of Venus, Planet Walk, Music in the Woods, and other free public viewings. Wherever there is a crowd of people and a clear sky he can be found. Locally known as Starman-JER, Jerry offers both nighttime stargazing and daytime solar viewing at various events.



Kelli Fitzpatrick is a science fiction writer, gamewriter, and teacher. She authored the 2025 novel *Captain Marvel: Carol Danvers Declassified* and writes for the *Star Trek Adventures* role-playing game from

Modiphius. Her *Star Trek* story "The Sunwalkers" won the *2016 Strange New Worlds* contest from Simon and Schuster. She has written for NASA's Hubble Space Telescope outreach team and Arizona State University's Interplanetary Initiative. Kelli premieres a story in *Twisting Turning Timeshifts*, *HERitage Volume* 2 at Shore Leave 45.



Kellam de Forest served as a paid consultant during the time of the original *Star Trek* television series. During this time, he made significant contributions to *Star Trek*'s content. **Ann de Forest** is one of three children

interviewed for the chapter devoted to Kellam's contributions in the book *Inspired Enterprise*. Today, Ann writes fiction and nonfiction that often centers on the resonance of place. She is a contributing writer for *Hidden City Philadelphia* and editor of *Extant*.



Michael Jan Friedman is the author of more than 80 books, nearly half of them set somewhere in the wilds of the *Star Trek* universe, as well as 200 comic book stories and almost 100 pieces of short fiction. He has

contributed to a variety of licensed universes, including Aliens, Predator, Wolf Man, Lois and Clark, DC Super Heroes, Marvel Super Heroes, and Wishbone. Eleven of his titles have appeared on the New York Times bestseller list. Friedman also co-wrote the story for the Star Trek: Voyager episode "Resistance," which featured Joel Grey.



Multiple Nebula Award winner **Esther Friesner** has published over forty novels (including two *Star Trek* titles), more than two hundred short stories, and has edited eleven anthologies including the *Chicks*

in Chainmail series for Baen Books. She is also the author of the *Princesses of Myth* YA series for Random House.



David Gerrold is the author of over 50 books, hundreds of articles and columns, and over a dozen television episodes. He is a classic sci-fi writer who has created some of the most popular and redefining scripts, books,

and short stories in the genre. TV credits include episodes from *Star Trek* ("The Trouble With Tribbles" and "The Cloud Minders"), *Star Trek Animated* ("More Tribbles, More Troubles" and "Bem"), *Babylon 5* ("Believers"), and many others. Novels include *When HARLIE Was One, The Man Who Folded Himself, The War Against The Chtorr* septology, and many more sci-fi classics. His autobiographical story *The Martian Child* won the Hugo and Nebula awards for Best Novelette.



Phil Giunta's novels include the paranormal mysteries *Testing* the Prisoner, By Your Side, and Like Mother, Like Daughters. His short stories appear in two dozen anthologies of science fiction,

fantasy, horror, and more. He is a multiple award-winning author and member of the Horror Writers Association, the National Federation of Press Women, and the Greater Lehigh Valley Writers Group. Phil is currently working on his fourth paranormal mystery novel while plotting his triumphant escape from the pressures of corporate America where he has been imprisoned for thirty years.



A lifelong pop culture fan, **Robert Greenberger** worked for Starlog Press and created *Comics Scene*, the first nationally distributed magazine to focus on comic books, comic strips, and animation. After working at DC

Comics, Gist Communications, and Marvel Comics, he joined Weekly World News as its Managing Editor and helped revitalize *Famous Monsters of Filmland* and served as News Editor at ComicMix.com. With others, he cofounded Crazy 8 Press. His dozens of books, short stories, and essays cover the gamut from young adult nonfiction to original fiction. Bob teaches High School English in Maryland and is an adjunct professor at Maryland College Institute of Art. Bob premieres *PRISM: The Mission Files* at Shore Leave 45.



Alexa Halford is a perfect example of what happens when you study in Minnesota and develop a passion for space. Now a space physicist, she earned her PhD in Australia, which occasionally leads her to say

"x, y, zed" instead of "x, y, zee." Currently, she serves as the NASA Goddard Ionosphere, Thermosphere, Mesosphere Lab chief, heading the most "down to Earth" lab in NASA's heliophysics division—though she and her team still spend most days with their heads in the clouds. When she's not enthusiastically discussing plasma waves, you'll likely find her at a local bookstore coffee shop or tending to her garden.



Greg Hodgin is the CEO of ZC Institute. He graduated from Emory University with a Bachelor's degree in Chemistry and from Georgia State University with a Bachelor's degree in History, and a Master's and Ph.D. in Political Science. He has tussled

with the Russians at the United Nations (and won) and defended and expounded refugee and IDP rights on the floor of the UN on two continents. He has also had two machetes and an AK-47 shoved in his face while doing field work. He is an avid gamer, which helps sharpen his diplomatic skill set. He is currently serving as the CEO of ZC Institute, a fusion startup that is engaging in quantum spacetime distortion research to create microfusion reactors, turning sci-fi into reality, one bubble at a time.



Thomas R. Holtz, Jr. is Principal Lecturer in Vertebrate Paleontology at the Department of Geology, University of Maryland, College Park. His research focuses on the origin, evolution, adaptations, and

behavior of carnivorous dinosaurs, and especially of tyrannosauroids (Tyrannosaurus rex and its kin). He received his Bachelors in Earth & Planetary Geology at Johns Hopkins in 1987 and his Ph.D. from the Department of Geology & Geophysics at Yale in 1992. He is also a Research Associate of the Department of Paleobiology of the Smithsonian Institution National Museum of Natural History and serves on the Scientific Council of Maryland Academy of Science (which operates the Maryland Science Center in Baltimore).



Jacob Jones-Goldstein, founding member of Oddity Prodigy Productions, is an author, journalist, and editor. His stories have appeared in anthologies and magazines such as *Plague of Shadows* from Smart Rhino

Glenn Hauman has over 25 years of experience in publishing and was a pioneer in ebooks. Mr. Hauman has worked as an author, graphic designer, editor, photo retoucher, CD-ROM producer, story consultant

for films, and radio show host. His *Star Trek* book, *Creative Couplings*, got worldwide press coverage for its portrayal of the first Klingon-Jewish wedding. In addition to *Star Trek*, he's written other licensed tie-in works for *X-Men* and *Farscape*, and urban fantasy for Baen Books, and he was the colorist for Mike Grell's *Jon Sable Freelance: Ashes Of Eden* graphic novel as part of his work for ComicMix.



Greg Kennedy began work at the Smithsonian in 1971 while the new National Air and Space Museum was being constructed. After serving in the Army starting in 1972, he returned to NASM in 1975 where he

was employed until 1984. He was a close friend of Fred Durant and oversaw some of the restoration work done on the 11-foot production model Enterprise during its display at the museum.



Stephen Lesnik Stephen Lesnik has been in the cybersecurity and education fields for over forty years. He has a history of working with both government and commercial organizations providing network

development, systems engineering, and security

engineering to big and small customers. He has provided both corporate and collegiate education, teaching both specific capabilities and broad concepts in computing and cybersecurity, and has worked with independent professional organizations in the development of professionally recognized certification exams. He is a member of HWA, Pennwriters, and the Bethlehem Writers Group. And he has far too many interests for his own good.

Patti Yasutake (9/6/1953 - 8/5/2024) was best known to fans as Nurse Alyssa Ogawa on *Star Trek: TNG*. She was also seen on the TV series *T.J. Hooker* and *Boston Legal*.



David McIntee (12/31/1968 - 12/15/2024) was a British author who wrote SF/F, including *Star Trek* and *Dr. Who*, as well as political commentary. He was an active member of the SCA.



Harris Yulin (11/5/1937 - 6/10/2025) was best known to fans as Aamin Marritza in *ST:DS9*'s groundbreaking episode "Duet." He appeared in over a hundred film and television series roles.

Please feel free to come to the auction and spend money. Your credit is good with us ... as long as it's MasterCard and Visa.

Art Show Rules and Regulations

• No food or drinks are allowed in the Art Show. There will be a bag check in the Hallway.

- The Art Show will accept cash, checks with valid ID, and credit cards (VISA, MasterCard) as payment for art purchases.
- Photography of any type is not allowed in the Art Show.
- Children must be accompanied by a responsible parent or guardian.

Bidding

- All bidders must register at the Art Show Desk.
- Three (3) bids on a piece will send it to Auction. If there is a Quick Sale Price listed on the Bid sheet, the piece can be immediately purchased for that price as long as no one else has bid on the item first. You must take the Bid sheet to the Art Show desk.
- If you are either the only bidder, or the second bidder and do not get outbid, the piece is yours. Please check with the Art Show Staff to pay for and pick up your art.

Purchase Pick-up

- The art show will be open for a limited time immediately after the auction, for those who wish to pick up their purchases.
- The art show will reopen Sunday morning from 10AM to noon, for pick-up of art. Please remember, a bid is a contract to buy; make sure you check to see if you won. We do not call winning bidders.

For Artists

- All pieces must be titled, matted, and/or framed. All art should be protected with shrink-wrap or equivalent. The Art Show will not be responsible for inadequately protected art.
- All pieces must have artist's or agent's name and address clearly labeled on the back. We allow a maximum of 20 pieces per artist; any exceptions will be granted at the discretion of the Art Show Chair.
- The Art Show will collect a 12% commission on all sales. "Not For Sale" (NFS) items will not be accepted into the Art Show.

- Adult oriented material will be hung so that young eyes cannot see it. The Art Show Chair reserves the right to determine the suitability of any art submitted.
- Signed limited edition prints will be allowed in the Art Show with the following stipulations:
 - o Prints must be clearly labeled as "print" on the control sheet.
 - o All prints must have serial number and series (i.e. 12 of 40).
 - o Only one copy of a print series will be allowed. Please be advised that we do not run a print shop due to limited space.
- Artists/Agents will be responsible for hanging their own artwork on Friday and Saturday. If we find that space is in short supply and there is a need to move art closer together, please be assured that we will treat your art with loving care. Control and bid sheets will be provided in the show and are available in advance from the Art Show Chair.
- Only low-wattage light displays will be allowed and must be on an intermittent timer to prevent heat buildup.
- The Art Show does not sell panel space. Art is hung on a "first come" basis and the space is free. Our buyers come early; you should, too.
- Anyone owing money to Shore Leave will be allowed to enter their art in the Art Show; however, the money they owe will be deducted from any sales made.
- Judging will take place on Saturday morning. Categories will be established by the Art Show Chair. All those wishing to have their work judged must have their art in place by 10am on Saturday.
- Art that is not picked up on time will become the property of Shore Leave.
- Anyone producing art that makes use of photographs or stills from a movie or TV show, or any other copyrighted source, must be able to show proof that the images were obtained from an outlet licensed to trade in those images and that the appropriate royalties were paid. If you are unsure as to whether your art falls into this category, please email the Art Show Chair and we can discuss it. Licensed fabric does NOT fall into this category as the royalty was paid by the manufacturer of the fabric.
- No AI created art work is allowed.

Mail-in Artists

- Artists are limited to 3 panels or 2 tables (or a combination of the two) with a maximum of 20 pieces. If your pieces are very small or you have other reasons to ask for an exception, contact me.
- Mail-in art should be shipped in time to arrive no later than June 30.
- Please insure your art.
- A check sufficient to cover return shipping and insurance, must accompany your art. Any funds not used will be returned to the artist.
- All art will be returned in the packaging in which it arrived and will be shipped via the same carrier.
- Bid sheets must be attached to each item and the control sheet must be filled out, completely. If you send a duplicate of the control sheet, it will be completed and returned along with any unsold art.
- Please specify on the control sheet the insurance amount for each item, so that your returning art will be properly insured.
- Mail art to: *Please email me for shipping information*.
- Once you ship your art, please send me an email with your tracking information so that I am aware of the package's expected arrival date and can follow it online.
- All correspondence, questions, tracking numbers, requests for accommodation, etc, should be directed to: jenniferm@shore-leave.com.

The Art Show Chair will be the final authority on all matters pertaining to the Show and Auction. Violation of any of these rules will result in your expulsion from the Art Show.

Shore Leave 45 Masquerade Information

While many Shore Leave attendees wear costumes in the convention hallways (though it is by no means required), the Masquerade is the event where costumers can get up on stage and show off their art for the greatest number of people at once.

For the audience, the Masquerade is a little like a beauty pageant mixed with a talent show. Costumers may appear alone on stage or as part of a group. The MC introduces each presentation, then the entry gets a minute or so to show off their costume(s) to the audience. Sometimes it's just a sort of fashion show walk out on stage, but often there's a short skit involved which can explain the character represented and provide some context for the costume and entertainment for the audience.

For the costumers involved, it does require some effort and sacrifice. If you want to appear in the Masquerade, you'll be occupied for most of Saturday evening of the convention. You'll need to sign up no later than 3:30pm on Saturday afternoon, be in the Green Room by 6:30pm, and, if you decide to stick around after your presentation to see if you've won an award, it might be close to midnight before you can get on with other activities. We do try to get things wrapped up before then and to make your backstage time as comfortable as possible. Young Fans (age 12 and under) go onstage first, and their awards are given right away, so that they don't have to stay up past their bedtime.

Costumes are judged both on their appearance and the effectiveness of the presentation. Costumers may also choose to show their work to the Handiwork Judges before the stage presentation, especially if they want to highlight details that might not be visible from a distance, such as the fine finish of interior seams.

Registration will take place between 10:00 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. at the Masquerade table. All forms, documentation, and music must be turned in by 3:30pm. Equipment will be available at the registration table to check that digital media will play

General Information

- All contestants must sign a release form. Although only one registration form is needed per group costume, each member of the group must sign a release.
- The Green Room will open at 5:30pm in the lounge adjoining the Lincoln Theater. Please check in as early as possible. (Contestants that have not checked in by 6:30pm will be scratched from competition.)
- A basic repair kit, makeup kit, and food will be available. However, please bring any specialty items you know you will need. Please do NOT bring your own food to the Green Room.
- If you think you will have trouble in your costume (e.g. moving, seeing, going up stairs) and have not already informed the tech crew, please notify the Green Room staff so that the tech crew can be ready to accommodate you.
- Items left onstage during a presentation will be brought back to the Green Room during the half time show. That said, please don't leave things onstage.


Rules of Competition

- You must be a registered member of Shore Leave to compete in the Masquerade.
- The Masquerade Committee reserves the right to listen to any audio submitted for inappropriate dialog.
- No nudity or obscenity. General guideline keep it PG-13.

- Time Limits:
 - o 45 seconds maximum for one person
 - 30 seconds for each additional person in the group up to a total of 3 minutes.
- If you wish to use prop weapons, you must clear them with the Masquerade Director.
- One costume per body multiple entries worn by one person or one entry worn by multiple people at multiple times are not allowed. This rule does not apply to costumes in a single presentation that require multiple operators.
- For safety reasons the following are not permitted:
 - o Live animals.
 - o Inebriated costumers.
 - Substances which might damage other costumes or the stage.
 - o Fire, flash powder, or other open flame.
 - Explosives or projectiles. Guns must be non-functioning and have a bright color plug or stripe on the muzzle; bows may be strung but arrows must remain in the quiver.
 - Any live steel will be expected to be peace bound. If you do not sufficiently bind it yourself, we will have zip ties on hand to do it for you.
- The Masquerade Director reserves the right to eliminate anyone from competition.
- Most importantly: Surprise the audience, but **NEVER** the Director or tech crew!







Jeri Taylor (June 30, 1938 - October 24, 2024)

Television writer-producer Jeri Taylor joined the *Star Trek: The Next Generation* writing staff during the series' fourth season. She became a co-executive producer, working with Rick Berman and Michael Piller, during *TNG*'s sixth season, and then served as the series' executive producer and showrunner for its final season.

Taylor went on to serve most notably as showrunner for *Star Trek: Voyager*, which she co-created with Berman and Piller. She ran the writers' room for *Voyager* during its first four seasons and penned more than 30 episodes of various *Star Trek* television series.

Before her tenure at *Star Trek*, the Eminy Award-nominated Taylor served as a producer on the series *Quincy*, *M.E.*, for which she also directed several episodes; *Magnum*, *P.I.*; *In the Heat of the Night*; and *Jake and the Fatman*. In addition, she co-wrote the CBS primetime movie *A Place to Call Home*,

















Peter Morwood (October 20, 1956 - May 9, 2025)
